THE WAY OF DUTY

We Pray ...

Heavenly Father, You give us duties to perform and purposes to serve. Through Your Spirit, help us to see these duties as gifts from You, to be offered to You. In Jesus' name. Amen.

Duty

Something Familiar to Lutherans

Duty historically has received strong emphasis among Lutherans. We owe this in part to Luther himself. For Martin Luther, duty was not only an important subject, but also an important motivator in living before God. The German word *öschuldigö* conveys this important understanding. *öSchuldigö* and *öSchuldigkeitö* have to do with

what is due, what is owed, and what is right before God. We find this word in Luther's Small Catechism, in Luther's explanation to The First Article of the Apostles' Creed. There, after noting all of God's gifts, both past and present, Luther writes: *öFor all of this I owe it [German öschuldigö] to God to thank and praise, serve and obey himö* (p. 355).

2 An older English translation (still familiar to many Lutherans) put it this way: *öFor all which it is my Duty to thank and praise, to serve and obey Himö* 3 At the end of his Small Catechism, Luther also included a section entitled *öDie Haustafel,ö* often translated in English as *öTable of Duties.ö* This section included Scriptural guidance for people in all kinds of states, with words *öparticularly pertinent to their office and duty.ö* Included in this *öTable of Dutiesö* is the listing of tasks and responsibilities for not only Bishops, Priests and Governing Authorities, but also Husbands, Wives, Parents, Children, etc. 2 Previous generations gave these *ödutiesö* closer attention as part of their catechetical instruction. Today, many Lutherans know of them only in passing. But *ödutyö* remains a familiar word and is in several well-known hymns.

Duty — Also Familiar to Others

Many others have also spoken of duty. At the very end of his message, the Old Testament author of Ecclesiastes wrote: *öThe end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the whole duty of man. For God will*

bring every deed into judgment, with every secret thing whether good or evil. Ecclesiastes 12:13-14 Mark Twain once said: *öDo something every day that you don't want to do; this is the golden rule for acquiring the habit of doing your duty without painö* 4 Mother Teresa once said: *öDuty is a very personal thing. It is what comes from knowing the need to take action and not just a need to urge others to do somethingö*

A True Story of Duty / Delight

I remember a day long ago when I entered the kitchen of my parents' home. Dad, retired now for years, was at the table going through papers and jotting down numbers. As I approached, Dad looked up with a mark of sadness on his face and said, *öI don't know if your mom and I will be able to tithe any longer. öI never knew you were tithing,ö* I replied. *öWe always did,ö* Dad responded, *öbut now things are so different.ö* What followed was a bit of an education in the family's finances. Having worked many years in a factory, Dad had a monthly pension check of \$250. There was a monthly Social Security check as well, but that was about it. Mom had been a homemaker, with only a few part-time jobs. Savings were minimal, especially as Dad and Mom had put both my sister and me through college, and Dad's health problems forced him to retire before turning 65. There had been no sizable inheritance, and now Mom and Dad, well into their 60s, were facing new financial realities. *öI am so sad,ö* Dad went on to say,

and I knew he meant it, because Mom and Dad loved the Lord and considered it a joy and privilege to give 10 percent of their annual income to their congregation. "I just hope we don't outlive our money," I remember Dad saying. Well, they didn't. More important-ly, their sadness at the thought of not tithing taught me something important about both the duty and delight of giving. What I learned on that day was a true lesson in faithfulness, through the example of my parents.

Some Thoughts and Questions for Further Discussion

Why is the concept of duty so important in the military? Can you think of any occasion when a sense of duty might be a more fitting motivator than a sense of delight? In what sense, if any, could we say that God is also motivated by duty? Jesus speaks of what the Pharisees ought to do (their religious duty) in Matthew 23:23. But Jesus also seems to say that the thoughts of the Pharisees were still "missing the boat." Why was that the case? Can you think of an example from your own life when duty was motivating you? What are the benefits, as well as the limits, of a sense of duty when it comes to supporting a particular cause or charity?

Consider the following words by C.S. Lewis:

"Then comes another discovery. Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from

moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already. So that when we talk of a man doing anything for God or giving anything to God, I will tell you what it is really like. It is like a small child going to its father and saying, "Daddy, give me sixpence to buy you a birthday present." Of course, the father does, and he is pleased with the child's present. It is all very nice and proper, but only an idiot would think that the father is sixpence to the good on the transaction." 7 What are some of the dangers of a sense of duty, when it comes to any thoughts of "giving something to God"?

What is a Moravian Lovefeast?

The Moravian Lovefeast is a service of song at which a simple meal is served to the congregation. This meal, usually a bun and coffee, is an act of fellowship. It is not a sacrament, or a substitute for Communion.

The Lovefeast, begun by the Moravians in 1727, is a revival of the Agape (*love*) Meal of the early Christian church. Almost any special occasion is appropriate for a Lovefeast. They are held to celebrate important festival days, to honor guests, to recognize a congregation's milestones, to bid a farewell to neighbors moving away, or to bind the church community into a spiritual unity when this need was felt.

There is usually singing during a Lovefeast and the meal takes place while the hymns are being sung. The spirit of the service is one of devotion and dignity. When the whole congregation has been served, a grace is prayed in unison. Then, while the choir sings, the congregation partakes of the spiritual fellowship of the Lovefeast.

Today, churches of many denominations have adapted the Moravian Lovefeast to their own use to address similar communal spiritual needs. Advent will host a Lovefeast on **Sunday, December 16, 2018 at 6 p.m.** Please feel free to share this with your neighbors and family.
